## Hebrews 9.11-14

But when Christ came as a high priest of the good things that have come, then through the greater and perfect tent (not made with hands, that is, not of this creation), he entered once for all into the Holy Place, not with the blood of goats and calves, but with his own blood, thus obtaining eternal redemption. For if the blood of goats and bulls, with the sprinkling of the ashes of a heifer, sanctifies those who have been defiled so that their flesh is purified, how much more will the blood of Christ, who through the eternal Spirit offered himself without blemish to God, purify our conscience from dead works to worship the living God!

## Mark 12.28-34

One of the scribes came near and heard them disputing with one another, and seeing that he answered them well, he asked him, 'Which commandment is the first of all?' Jesus answered, 'The first is, "Hear, O Israel: the Lord our God, the Lord is one; you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength." The second is this, "You shall love your neighbour as yourself." There is no other commandment greater than these.' Then the scribe said to him, 'You are right, Teacher; you have truly said that "he is one, and besides him there is no other"; and "to love him with all the heart, and with all the understanding, and with all the strength", and "to love one's neighbour as oneself",—this is much more important than all whole burnt-offerings and sacrifices.' When Jesus saw that he answered wisely, he said to him, 'You are not far from the kingdom of God.' After that no one dared to ask him any question.


For all the saints who showed your love in how they lived and where they moved, for mindful women, caring men, accept our gratitude again.

Whilst the building of All Saints West Dulwich was being reconstructed after the fire in 2000, the PCC decided to have the name of a saint engraved on the back of each chair. When the church re-opened in 2006, parishioners and friends of All Saints were invited to 'Sponsor a Saint'. The history of each saint is recorded, with the name of the person for whom the saint has been chosen, in the Blue Book of Saints. This is kept on the Eagle Lectern. The chairs cost about £140 each when they were bought. We have aimed at a donation of at least £50 per saint. There are 45 saints still unsponsored and we would like to try to have all of them sponsored. All proceeds will go towards the ongoing development of the church building.
