Palms Liturgy Luke 19.28-40

After he had said this, he went on ahead, going up to Jerusalem.

When he had come near Bethphage and Bethany, at the place called the Mount of Olives, he sent two of the disciples, saying, ‘Go into the village ahead of you, and as you enter it you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden. Untie it and bring it here. If anyone asks you, “Why are you untying it?” just say this: “The Lord needs it.”’ So those who were sent departed and found it as he had told them. As they were untying the colt, its owners asked them, ‘Why are you untying the colt?’ They said, ‘The Lord needs it.’ Then they brought it to Jesus; and after throwing their cloaks on the colt, they set Jesus on it. As he rode along, people kept spreading their cloaks on the road. As he was now approaching the path down from the Mount of Olives, the whole multitude of the disciples began to praise God joyfully with a loud voice for all the deeds of power that they had seen, saying,
‘Blessed is the king
who comes in the name of the Lord!
Peace in heaven,
and glory in the highest heaven!’
Some of the Pharisees in the crowd said to him, ‘Teacher, order your disciples to stop.’ He answered, ‘I tell you, if these were silent, the stones would shout out.’

Passion Liturgy Philippians 2.5-11

Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form, he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death—even death on a cross.

Therefore God also highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Prayer Matters Palm Sunday : 14th April 2019

Please keep in your prayers this week:

Holy Week: that as we enter into the sufferings of Jesus during Holy Week, we may open our own hearts to the Way of the Cross, the way of self-giving and surrender to God's will; that we may become more responsive to the suffering around us; that through celebrating Holy Week the world-wide Christian Church may reaffirm its mission as the body of Christ on earth.

The Holy Land: that the places where Jesus walked and suffered may no longer be the focus of conflict; that the state of Israel and the Palestinian territories may together move towards a shared desire for dialogue and reconciliation; that the Holy Land may become a place of peace and justice, a country in which Jews, Christians and Muslims can live together as neighbours.

All who suffer persecution: as we remember Jesus' arrest and imprisonment, we pray for all Christians who suffer imprisonment, violence or death for practising their faith; all who are imprisoned for opposing unjust regimes; LGBT people who face the death penalty in certain countries, including Brunei as from last week; Amnesty International, which highlights abuses of human rights and takes up individual cases.

The Order of the Holy Paraclete in Whitby: as they leave the Priory for their new accommodation in the grounds of the Priory. For all members of the Order past and present in this time of transition and change.

Charity of the week: South London Refugees Welcome

The Welcome Team supports resettled families from Iraq and Syria and unaccompanied children placed with foster parents as they adjust to their new neighbourhoods. We pray that, as their language skills develop, the resettled refugees may integrate more fully into their communities and form friendships, and that those who seek work might find employment which fits their skills. We pray for the many organisations who work with Refugees Welcome, including those who recently organised the shared meal Kitchen Tales from Syria, which raised money and fostered a lively sense of community.

Those who have died recently and for all who mourn.

Commemorated this week on 19th April: Alphege, Archbishop of Canterbury

Alphege became a monk at Deerhurst near Gloucester and withdrew in later life to be a hermit in Somerset. The Archbishop of Canterbury, Dunstan, drew him back to be Abbot of Bath and, in 984, Bishop of Winchester. In 1005 he was made Archbishop of Canterbury, where his austere life and lavish almsgiving made him a revered and much-loved man. In the year 1011, the Danes overran south-east England, taking Alphege prisoner. They put the enormous ransom of £3000 on his head, but Alphege refused to pay it and forbade anyone from doing so, knowing that it would impoverish the ordinary people even more. He was brutally murdered by his captors at Greenwich on this day in the year 1012.

Thought for the Week:

This is the crucifixion of Christ: in which He dies again and again in the individuals who were made to share the joy and freedom of His grace, and who deny Him.
